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Livin' the dream: La Croûte Bakery Café

Anna Pipitone was literally born into the food service business. She learned the art of creating and presenting great food at her parent's knees. Her mother and father are Tony and Maria Pipitone, owners of Sam's Pizza Restaurant restaurant in Rockton, Illinois, and Pino's Pizza in Rockford, Illinois. Anna's brother, Alberto, is the owner of Fib's Restaurant and Al's Main Street Tap, in Rockton.

Anna grew up in the food world and worked in the family business. learning all aspects of running a restaurant. At an early age, she set her cap on one day owning her own business.

During her years as a student at Hononegah Community High School, one of her favorite classes was "Foods around the World."

Anna was also enrolled in the school's Incubator Program, taught by Jason Brunke, coordinator of Career and Technical Education at the school. The entrepreneur program focuses on learning how to create a new business. Brunke and a group of area business owners mentor and coach the students, teaching them the necessary skills, such as marketing, finance and economics to become business owners.

Anna said she learned a lot from the class. While still in high school, she developed Simply Sweet, a confectionary business that featured homemade candies. She sold the sweets at the family pizza restaurants and at Rockton River Market.

"Anna was a natural with creating products and finding a market," Brunke said. "Her business instincts, as well as her passion for baking was always evident. I am proud of Anna. She is a great role model for current and future students to know that hard work gets rewarded."

After graduating high school in 2018, she enrolled in the Culinary Institute of America (CIA) school in Napa Valley, California. She earned an associate degree in Baking and Pastry. Anna then transferred to the CIA New York campus in Hyde Park, New York, where she earned a bachelor degree in Food Business Management.

Simply Sweet has now morphed into La Croûte Bakery Café. After months of hard work and planning, Anna has transformed the large gray building at 116 W. Main Street in Rockton into a fully-equipped bakery and café with a European vibe. It was previously the location of eCom Elite Consulting, Home - In Rockton, and Butler's Emporium.

Espresso, soft drinks and lattes are also available.

Anna credits her dad for putting in a lot of effort and time to make the café attractive and functional.

Following tradition, a spectacular light display kicked off the Christmas season in Roscoe on Thanksgiving night, November 28, 2024. The Christmas spectacular, at 5524 Hodges Way in Roscoe, is hosted by Luis Roldan, known as Mr. Christmas. The lights are turned on at precisely 5 p.m., plus 10 seconds.

Luis Roldan, known as Mr. Christmas, has been lovingly creating a huge Christmas scene on his front yard for several years. Luis and his beloved wife Debbie started decorating for the holidays. Each year they did a little more.

In 2016, Debbie passed away. Before she died, she urged Luis to continue to create the holiday tradition. "She asked me to do it, for the children."

So, every year, with occasional help from his grandchildren, he keeps his pledge to Debbie.

"I am almost 84 now. It's getting a little more difficult to do it by myself."

Luis begins brainstorming and making plans for the next season right after the display comes down for the year. Then there are repairs to be made and hundreds of lights to be checked. His goal is to gradually have LED lights on all the decorations. So far 60 trees have LED lights.

Every year, he builds more and more trees, some as high as 30 feet, held in place by cables.

Each year he adds more lights, more characters and more Christmas trees. A mixture of whimsical characters, including Santa, his sleigh and eight reindeer, the nativity scene and angels cover the front and side lawn at his home. This year he has added a new baby Jesus lying in the manger.

It's become a Thanksgiving evening tradition to begin the Christmas season with a drive by the home of Mr. Christmas as the lights go up and the holiday season begins. The display will be lighting up the night until early January 2025. Families are invited to drive by and see the display throughout the holidays.

The impressive celebration of Christmas has become contagious in the Hodges Run neighborhood. Many homes in the subdivision are now lighting up the night.

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A rusty old Plymouth found a permanent home at Historic Auto Attractions

Picture this: It's the year 2007. A gold and white 1957 Plymouth Belvidere sports coupe with swooping rear wings is resurrected after 50 years, buried in a time capsule under the front lawn of the Tulsa, Oklahoma courthouse.

As part of Oklahoma's celebration of 50 years of statehood, the time capsule was sealed inside an underground cement vault in 1957, along with some Tulsa memorabilia and a can of gasoline so it could be driven away in the future by its lucky new owner.

In 1957, a brand-new gold and white 1957 Plymouth, nicknamed "Miss Belvidere," was buried inside a cement vault, and lowered into the ground on the front lawn of the Tulsa, Oklahoma Court House. When the time capsule was unearthed in 2007, it was covered with rust and beyond repair due to a leak in the vault.

On Oklahoma's 100th birthday (in 2007) the Plymouth was unearthed. But the vault wasn't water-tight after all. After being underground for 50 years, the car was a rusted mess. The exterior wasn't in great shape, but the interior was beyond repair.

It was filled with rust, mud and tangled pieces of wire, due to water intrusion in the cement vault. There was significant structural damage. Many items reminiscent of the times had been placed on the seat of the car. All of the historical time capsule pieces buried with the car were destroyed.

The inside of the 1957 Plymouth as it looked when resurrected from the time capsule in 2007. "Miss Belvidere" found her permanent home at the Historic Auto Museum, 13825 Metric Drive, Roscoe, Illinois. The city of Tulsa donated the car to owner Wayne Lensing. Copies of the historic novel, "The Buried Plymouth," written by Sanford Miles, are available at the museum.

Author Sanford Miles has written an historical novel: *The Buried Plymouth – A Story Unearthed in Tulsa*.

As his story goes, a fictional Tulsa, Oklahoma resident, Jacob Duncan, secretly buried something in the Plymouth that would amaze the world because of its historical significance and potential value.

Miles combines history and fiction in telling the story of the two-toned gold and white Plymouth Belvidere, nicknamed "Miss Belvidere." Miles skillfully weaves history and fiction together to create a story surrounding the burial and unearthing of the buried Plymouth. The story is reminiscent of the Stephen King novel, "Christine."

Sanford Miles is the author of "The Buried Plymouth." Miles said he has always loved classic cars and was fascinated with the history of "Miss Belvidere." He found and purchased an exact copy of the famous car on the internet and named it "Mr. Belvidere." The historical novel can be purchased at the Historic Auto Museum.

Since the unearthed Plymouth was beyond repair and of little value, the city of Tulsa wanted to donate it to the Smithsonian Museum in Washington, D.C. However, the museum said, Thanks, but no thanks. Tulsa officials decided to reach out to auto museums across the country.



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In 1957, a brand-new gold and white 1957 Plymouth, nicknamed "Miss Belvidere," was buried inside a cement vault, and lowered into the ground on the front lawn of the Tulsa, Oklahoma Court House. When the time capsule was unearthed in 2007, it was covered with rust and beyond repair due to a leak in the vault..

Wayne Lensing, owner of Historic Auto Attractions in Roscoe got wind of the historic car. "They reached out to me. I was more than happy to accept the car."

The car was delivered to the museum in 2017, where it was kept in storage. When Lensing added a 36,000 sq. ft. addition to the 50,000 sq ft museum, (it now totals over 86,000 sq. ft.), he found a perfect spot for "Miss Belvidere."

Historic Auto Attractions Museum now totals over 86,000 square feet.

Lensing placed the car in a special room of its own. Graphics telling the story of the unearthed 1957 Plymouth are on the surrounding walls. Artifacts such as a gallon of gas and a case of Schlitz Beer are displayed on the hood.

"I thought to myself, I've got to get that. It wasn't cheap – about \$35,000 for a car with an original sticker price of about \$2,400." He named this version, "Mr. Belvidere."

The site that will be used to run the event is Silent Auction Pro. Anyone who has bid in the past can login with their past login credentials. Or you can text 'G914' to 888-990-9876 to get the sign up link on your mobile device or computer. Then place a bid on awesome goods donated by various individuals, organizations and businesses.

Donations of baskets or other items are needed and welcome. Reach out through the Wimpy's Facebook page, or on Facebook Messenger, or contact a Lions Club member if you want to donate something for the auction. In addition to bidding on and collecting winning items, donations can given directly to the Lions Club through First National Bank and Trust, or they can be mailed to Rockton Lions Club, P.O. Wimpy's Fund began in memory of former Rockton police chief Everett Vaughan who served as chief from 1977-1981. He was given the nickname Wimpy based on the cartoon character in Popeye who walked the streets and carried a sandwich board.

As Vaughan was helping children cross the street, he would notice that some of the children didn't have gloves, hats and socks.



He went one step further and took the mothers of those families shopping to buy clothing, groceries and one gift for each child in need. His wife Betty provided Christmas dinner for the families; over time they added toys into the mix.

Vaughan passed away in 1997 and his friend Jack Stewart took action in carrying on his legacy. Other Lions Club members have teamed up over the years to make the Christmas season special by carrying on this long time tradition.

Many hours go into preparing for the auction. Volunteers work for at least a month, ith a weekly meeting to plan the next steps, and making phone calls to organize and gather donated items.

A group of core volunteers put the auction together led by co-chairs Terrie Garlow and Carol Wright. They gather donations and organize both the silent and live auction event. Many other Lions members lend a hand by donating or helping during the auction.

The overall process to make Wimpy's Fund come to life each year starts in October. Rockton Lions Club members and community volunteers spend a total of well over 200 hours of time on each Wimpy's Fund, including paperwork, communications with the schools, and other volunteer activities.

Volunteers for the delivery day are always too many to count. It is made up of a huge group of Lions members, people in the community, businesses, school districts and local churches. Rockton and Roscoe schools are key supporters of Wimpy's Fund.

"Giving Trees" are another place where needed items are collected and donated.

Businesses display tags for community members to adopt a family, employees in those businesses lend a helping hand by adopting a family or through donations of gifts for families. Extra donations come in from churches, and schools with some also adopting a family.

Several organizations hold toy drives and donate those toys to Wimpy's Fund.

Every year the Rockton Lions Club hosts Breakfast with Santa at the Rockton Christmas Walk. Funds from the breakfast also go toward Wimpy's Fund.

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Busse Prairie Preserve spans Illinois/Wisconsin border

Natural Land Institute (NLI) purchased a 327-acre natural area in September 2024, just north of NLI's Lost Flora Fen on Raccoon Creek, west of South Beloit. The property was named the Jerry and Kathy Busse Prairie Preserve on Raccoon Creek. It features wetlands, ponds, a lake, Raccoon Creek and grassland bird habitat.

This pristine property is home to several threatened and endangered species. It includes 196.52 acres in Illinois (northern Winnebago County) and 130.25 acres in Wisconsin (southern Rock County). The purchase was completed for \$816,925 plus closing costs.

The Busses purchased the naming rights for this preserve with a \$500,000 gift to NLI because they have a passion for protecting nature. Jerry Busse is the retired CEO and Founder of Rockford Toolcraft Inc.

Busse Prairie Preserve will open to the public at a date to be announced. Dorothy Baits gave \$50,000 to name the walking trails, which will be called the "Stephen and Dorothy Baits Trail."

NLI staff and volunteer wildlife monitors have found many threatened and endangered species there, including the Hine's Emerald Dragonfly, Blanding's Turtle, Rusty Patched Bumble Bee, and a plethora of other plants and animals of conservation concern. Eastern Meadowlarks, Bobolinks, Dickcissels, and Henslow's Sparrows are key grassland birds that will have nesting habitat protected at the preserve.

NLI purchased the Busse Prairie Preserve for its incredible variety of plants and animals and to protect the water, fish and other aquatic species, and other wildlife. "We are thrilled to be able to protect this property. It is such an incredible complex of wetlands and wet grasslands and hosts an amazing variety of birds, wildflowers, and pollinators," said Alan Branhagen, Executive Director, Natural Land Institute. "The big views of the skyline from here are impressive," he said. (The natural skyline, that is. No urban skyline is visible there.)

Other naming opportunities were available for naming the lake, the bur oak grove, and the walking trails. A gift of \$50,000 was received from an anonymous donor to name the lake, "Lake AJ," after their two daughters' first names, Andrea and Jessica. A gift of \$50,000 was received from the Vanderpoel Family and the Vanderpoel Conservation Foundation to name the bur oak grove "The Vanderpoel Family Bur Oak Grove."

Burr or bur? NLI also owns Burr Oak Valley Nature Preserve, between Burr Oak Road and Elevator Road in Roscoe, but the more official spelling for the Quercus macrocarpa tree is "bur" with one R.

While this property already has one level of protection with enrollment in the Wetland Reserve Program, NLI will further protect it by managing it for invasive species and any trickle down impact to NLI's other holdings on Raccoon Creek such as Lost Flora Fen on Raccoon Creek and Nygren Wetland Preserve. NLI will also protect it from tree and shrub encroachment, which would eventually destroy the grassland habitat.

Closer to Rockton, in September the William & Gayle Keefer Nature Reserve opened to the public on a daily basis, sunrise to sunset (no pets, though). This site includes three quarries, fossils, woodlands, and remnant prairie The public access address and parking lot are located at 12804 Old River Rd., Rockton, Ill. 61072.
